Resolution on Behalf of a Diocesan and Parish-Level Response to the Urgent Issues of Climate Change and Environmental Justice (Final Version After Resolution Hearing)

Resolved, that the Diocese of Oregon commit to a goal of net carbon neutrality by 2030 for all facilities, churches, and operations through reducing emissions from travel, reducing energy use, increasing energy efficiency in buildings, supporting green energy production, and purchasing offsets from duly investigated, responsible, and ethical partners; and be it further

Resolved, that the diocese commit to exploring creative ways to support parishes in taking actions toward mitigating their negative impacts on the viability and beauty of God's world; and be it further

Resolved, that the Creation Care Working Group appointed by Bishop Akiyama collaborate with others in the Diocese in pursuing their charge and report to the Bishop, the Diocese's governing bodies, and the congregations within the Diocese regarding its work, and provide resources that can assist the Diocese, the congregations, and individuals to move toward carbon neutrality by 2030.

## **Explanation:**

We believe as Christians that God's first charge to us was to care for and protect "our island home," and all its inhabitants. Many of us confronted the awesomeness of that charge, and the power of its call on us to act—to translate words and intentions into deeds—when we heard the Episcopal Church's voice raised on behalf of creation care.

Growing out of our Presiding Bishop's passionate concern, and following on the work accomplished at the 79<sup>th</sup> General Convention, our Church made available to us a beautifully written *Pledge to Care for Creation* as a way of encouraging climate change mitigation efforts and creation care work in general. It was written for us as individual Episcopalians, and aimed at encouraging individual commitment to living into God's charge to care for creation. But beyond *individual* commitment, *collective* commitment—congregational and diocesan commitment—is possible and desirable as well.

In keeping with that understanding, the 80<sup>th</sup> General Convention this year affirmed that "global climate change is not only a scientific concern or environmental issue, but what the United Nations calls 'the defining issue of our time... at a defining moment'." Resolution AO87\*, passed on July 11, 2022, defined this commitment as follows:

- 1) "that the Episcopal Church commit to a goal of net carbon neutrality in its operations and the work of staff, standing commissions, interim bodies, and General Convention by 2030, through a combination of reducing emissions from travel, reducing energy use, increasing energy efficiency in buildings, and purchasing offsets from duly investigated, responsible, and ethical partners;" and
- 2) "that the General Convention encourage parishes, dioceses, schools, camps, and other Episcopal institutions to pursue their own goal of net carbon neutrality by 2030 through a combination of reducing emissions from travel, reducing energy use, increasing energy efficiency in buildings, and purchasing offsets from duly investigated, responsible, and ethical partners."

The Episcopal Diocese of Oregon is thus enjoined by the General Convention to address in a meaningful way this Great Work. This resolution proposes action necessary for the Diocese of Oregon to positively affirm the National Church's commitment represented in Resolution A087.

As part of our commitment to doing so, Bishop Akiyama has commissioned a Creation Care Working Group, charged with implementing a much increased communicational and organizational diocesan focus on the urgent issues of climate change and environmental justice in Western Oregon—this land we care for, its people, and all its other living things. Please support this resolution and affirm in this way our love for God and for our place in God's creation.
