The Bishop called convention to order at 9:00 a.m. Morning Prayer for Individuals and Families was led by the Rev. Dn. Julie Jensen, St. John the Baptist, Portland

Third Ballot

The results of the third ballot were announced.

World Café IV

The Rev. Sara Fischer led the convention in the fourth World Café conversation.

Suspension of St. Francis, Sweet Home and St. Paul's, Powers

The Bishop provided the following background:

Last year the people of St. Francis worked with the Rev. Julia Fritts to prayerfully consider their life together. Following several months of testing the congregation voted to close and asked the Bishop to close the congregation. Their life as a congregation was celebrated in a service months ago.

In the case of St. Paul's in Powers, this congregation has been kept going for years by the good work of the clergy in charge of St. James, Coquille. Until recently, there were a handful of individuals worshipping in the congregation the most dedicated of which was a woman by the name of Mary. Weeks ago, Mary suffered a life altering stroke and she is moving out of state to live with her daughter. In consultation with the Rev. Albie Hazen, the Bishop has been asked to close that congregation as well. A celebration of their life as a congregation will take place in the months ahead.

Suspension of St. Francis in Sweet Home.

Passed both orders. The Bishop announced that with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee he declares St. Francis in Sweet Home dissolved.

Suspension of St. Paul in Powers.

Passed both orders. The Bishop announced he will seek the advice and consent of the Standing Committee regarding the dissolution of St. Paul's in Powers.

The Bishop led the convention in praying the Nunc Dimittis.

(see Appendix, page 38) Approved by a majority vote. Will lie over until the next annual meeting of convention requiring approval by two-thirds of each Order voting separately, and by the Bishop, before adoption.

Proposal to Amend Canon 1.5

To streamline and simplify the process by which the Diocese and Oregon Episcopal School (OES) cooperatively select Trustees of OES. (see Appendix, page 39) Clergy: two-thirds in favor; lay two-thirds in favor. Passed.

Proposal to Amend Canon 3.2

To conform to the Canons of The Episcopal Church regarding real property. (See Appendix, page 39) Clergy: two-thirds in favor; lay two-thirds in favor. Passed.

SECTION 2 Lay Delegates to 123rd Diocesan Convention

Article V, Sec. 5 of the Constitution, cites authority for the number of Delegates that each congregation is entitled to send to Convention.

Sec. 5. Lay members shall consist of Delegates from Parishes and Missions as provided in this section. The number of Lay Delegates to Convention for each Parish and Organized Mission in union with the Convention, and with written approval of the Bishop, from each Parochial Mission shall be according to the following schedule:

Sec. 7. (b) Notwithstanding subsection (a), duly elected or appointed Lay members of Board of Trustees, Standing Committee, and Diocesan Council shall have all rights, including the right to vote, at annual Conventions.

This corporation is a Corporation Sole, represented by the Bishop and his successors in office, in perpetuity. A convenient legal depository of funds and property held for the benefit of the Church. The funds are administered by the Bishop and invested in the Diocese of Oregon Pooled Investment Fund.

"The Diocese Of Oregon"

The Church in this Diocese is incorporated under the name of The Diocese of Oregon, 11800 SW Military Lane, Portland, Oregon 97219. The corporation holds in trust all property given for objects connected with the Church in this Diocese other than property held by parochial or other corporations. The Bishop and the Officers and Board of Trustees, elected by the Diocesan Convention, administer the funds.

"Legacy Good Samaritan Hospital and Medical Center"

A part of the Legacy Health System, this nonprofit corporation controls, manages and operates Legacy Good Samaritan Hospital and Medical Center, 1015 NW 22nd Avenue, Portland, Oregon 97210. The Bishop and one Director, elected by Diocesan Convention, serve on the Legacy Health System Board of Directors.

"Good Samaritan Hospital Corvallis"

This nonprofit corporation controls, manages and operates the Good Samaritan Hospital Corvallis, 3600 NW Samaritan Drive, Corvallis, Oregon 97339. The Bishop is the Chairman of the Board of Directors and appoints two additional Board members.

"Samaritan Village"

This nonprofit corporation controls, manages and operates Samaritan Village, 285 NW 35th Street, Corvallis, Oregon 97330, the retirement facility sponsored by The Diocese of Oregon. This facility has been in operation since September 1, 1962 and continues to operate at full capacity, with a short waiting list. The Bishop is President of the Board of Trustees.

"Oregon Episcopal School"

This nonprofit corporation controls, manages and operates Oregon Episcopal School, a school for boys and girls, formerly known as St. Helen's Hall and Bishop Dagwell Hall, at 6300 SW Nicol Road, Portland, Oregon 97223. The Bishop serves as Chairman of the Board and the Diocesan Convention elects nine Trustees, annually electing three Trustees to serve three-year terms on a rotation basis.

"Center For Community Counseling"

This nonprofit corporation controls, manages and operates the Center for Community Counseling, 1465 Coburg Road, Eugene, Oregon 97401, a counseling agency. The Bishop appoints one member of the Board of Directors.

Appendix

Resolution I – Criminal Justice

Resolved: The Prison Ministry Commission of the Diocese of Oregon is urged to join with others of good will, especially other religious communities in Oregon, to work toward improvements in both public understanding and government policy in the administration of criminal justice in Oregon; and

be it **further resolved** that:

This Convention <u>calls upon urges</u> the people of the Diocese of Oregon to seek greater understanding, and compassionate engagement with those touched by crime: victims, criminals, public servants, and their family members, especially those who suffer individually and uniquely.

Action of Convention: ADOPTED AS AMENDED.

Resolution II: Focusing on People Living in Poverty

Resolved, that the 124th Convention of the Episcopal Church in Western Oregon call upon all of its constituent committees, commissions, institutions, and congregations, to include as part of every meeting in calendar year 2013, no matter what the purpose, the following agenda item: "How will what we are doing here affect or involve people living in poverty?"

Resolved, that the 124th Convention of the Diocese of Oregon urge its constituent committees, commissions, institutions, and congregations to implement General Convention Resolution A135 paying particular attention to the third resolved.

Action of convention: ADOPTED AS AMENDED

Explanation:

At the 2009 General Convention, Resolution A155 called for the establishment of a program to address domestic poverty and called on The Episcopal Church to "recognize the pressing challenges to those living in poverty and the working poor throughout this nation[.]" At the recently concluded 2012 General Convention, Resolution A135 called for a number of steps to be taken to address the alleviation of poverty and increasing economic and racial justice. The third "resolved" of A135, which came to be known as the "Deacons' resolved" states as follows:

Resolved, that the church cultivate mindfulness about poverty in our community and world as well as the poverty into which Christ calls us by including in our prayer and in every meeting agenda, time for reflection on how our work engages issues of poverty and economic and racial justice[.]

Constitution & Canons: Actions Taken by Diocesan Convention 2012

Constitutional proposals to be considered in 2013 & new versions of canons

1. Proposed amendment to the Constitution, Article 3

Passed 10/27/12; will lie over until 2013 for final vote.

Resolved, Article 3 of the Constitution of The Diocese of Oregon be amended to read:

Sec. 1. The authority of this Diocese is vested in the Bishop <u>Diocesan</u>, the Bishop Coadjutor (if there be one), the Convention and the Standing Committee.

Sec. 2. The Bishop <u>Diocesan</u> is the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese. The Bishop <u>Diocesan</u> may at any time authorize, in writing, the Bishop Coadjutor or the Standing Committee to act as the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese, and such authority shall be in force until withdrawn in writing.

Sec. 3. The Bishop Diocesan shall not be absent from the Diocese for more than three consecutive months without first obtaining the consent of the Standing Committee.

Sec. 4. The Bishop Diocesan shall not be absent from the Diocese for six consecutive months or more without authorizing in writing, under hand and seal, the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, or, if not, the Standing Committee, to act as Ecclesiastical Authority during the absence.

Sec. 5. In the event the Bishop Diocesan is unable to carry out the duties of the office and is incapable of authorizing the Bishop Coadjutor, or if there is none, the Standing Committee, to act as Ecclesiastical Authority, the Standing Committee shall initiate the process of seeking a declaration from the Presiding Bishop or an alternative Ecclesiastical Authority as prescribed by the Canons of The Episcopal Church.

Explanation

The Canons of The Episcopal Church (TEC) set out minimum requirements for the delegation of Ecclesiastical Authority to a Bishop Coadjutor or the Standing Committee (Canon III.12.4 and 12.8(p)). The current language of Article 3 does not cover all the circumstances set out in Canon III.12. These amendments are intended to remedy those gaps.

The word "Diocesan" has been added in each section to conform to the practice established by the Canons of TEC and to avoid any ambiguity over which bishop is being addressed, in case Oregon ever has additional bishop(s).

The current Section 3 has been combined with the current Section 2 to create the new Section 2.

The new Section 3 is proposed to address the need for diocesan consent to the Bishop Diocesan being absent from the Diocese for more than 3 consecutive months and clarifies which body will be asked for consent (TEC Canon III.12.4(b)).

The current Section 2 covers both cases of disability of the Bishop Diocesan and longer absences of the Bishop Diocesan. Under the TEC Canons, the two situations require different actions, but in neither case is the automatic succession described in Article 3 permitted. Therefore, the content is divided into two new sections.

The new Section 4 deals with long term absences of the Diocesan and requires the delegation of Ecclesiastical Authority if such an absence is going to occur (TEC Canon III.12.4(c)).

The new Section 5 deals with cases of disability and assigns to the Standing Committee the responsibility of initiating the canonical process set out in TEC Canon III.12.8(p).

2. Proposed amendment to the Constitution, Article 11

Passed 10/27/12; will lie over until 2013 for final vote.

Resolved, that Article 11, Section 4 be repealed and replaced as follows:

Sec. 4. In case of a vacancy in the Episcopate, the powers and duties to be performed by the Bishop in matters of discipline shall be performed by the Standing Committee, except in those cases where the powers and duties are or may be specially delegated to or enjoined upon the Clerical members of the Committee, in which case the power and duties shall be exercised by the Clerical members alone.

Sec. 4. In case of a vacancy in the Episcopate, the Standing Committee shall arrange, as prescribed in Canon IV.19.25, for another bishop to perform the duties of the Bishop Diocesan under Title IV of the Canons of The Episcopal Church.

Explanation:

In the revised Title IV of the Canons of The Episcopal Church (TEC) regarding clergy discipline, distinct roles are assigned to the Bishop Diocesan and the Standing Committee which would make it improper for the Standing Committee also to assume the responsibilities of the Bishop. Canon IV.19.25 therefore provides that the Diocese arrange for another bishop to perform these duties.

Since the Standing Committee cannot act as the current Section 4 dictates, this section needs to be repealed. However, it is appropriate for the Standing Committee, which is likely to be the Ecclesiastical Authority and meets frequently, to be the entity that makes the arrangements, on behalf of the diocese, for another bishop to undertake the disciplinary responsibilities.

3. Canon 1.5, Sec. 5-9 (as amended 10/27/12)

Sec. 5. The nominations so made shall be communicated to the Secretary who shall then send a list of the nominations to each Member of the Clergy and each Lay Delegate in the Diocese at least 30 days prior to the annual Convention. The information published before the Convention shall include current compliance status of each Parish or Mission with Canon 5.2 Section 3.

Sec. 6. All nominations shall be accompanied by biographical data, Parish/Mission identification, and the written consent of the nominee. Compliance with this requirement, in cases of nominations from the floor, may be waived by the Bishop or by a majority vote of Convention.

Sec. 7. Following the distribution of the printed list of the names placed in nomination by the Committee, the presiding officer of the Convention shall call for nominations from the floor.

Sec. 8. At the proper time in the annual Convention, the Secretary shall distribute a printed list of all nominations made to the Convention. Before voting, a ballot shall be distributed to each delegate present.

Sec. 9. Sections 5-8 of this Canon do not apply to nominees for Trustees of Oregon Episcopal School. Nominees for Trustees of Oregon Episcopal School shall be selected by the Oregon Episcopal School Board of Trustees after considering suggestions from the Parish Liaison Committee and the diocesan Nominating Committee, if any. The Bishop Diocesan or, if there is no Bishop Diocesan, the Ecclesiastical Authority shall appoint the nominees to the Oregon Episcopal School Board of Trustees. Such appointments shall be ratified by the Standing Committee and reported to the next annual meeting of the Convention of the Diocese.

4. Canon 3.2, Section 4 (as amended 10/27/12)

Sec. 4. The Trustees shall have no power to convey title to any real property, except by written consent of the Bishop and the Standing Committee.

Bishop Michael Hanley's Sermon at Convention Eucharist

My first question to you is, does anyone here know what the state fruit of Oregon is? [pause] Let me give you a hint. It's a pear. Now I went to the store the other day and I got four of 'em and thank goodness for me, they all had names on them. But I was showing them around to some folks last night and as I pulled them out they knew what they were. And not just pears but the name—anybody know what this one is? Comice. Right? Something like that. How about this one. Bartlett. Good, good. Bosc, good. One more. In there somewhere, oh well, you know what it is. Wrong glasses.

So why do you think that's the state pear? They grow here, ok, yeah, kind of south of here mostly. That's one of the reasons. Why else? They taste good. Already, yes, that's true. Last time I tried them, yes. Washington already had the apple. Actually, what happened was a group of people went to the state legislature and said, "We'd like to make this the state fruit." And it was the fruit growers, of course, and at least at the time they did that it was the ninth largest cash crop in Oregon. Now there's some other reasons why I think it happens to be a good fruit. Why do you think it might be good? Tastes great. These are really ancient they've got really tough skin don't they. I thought about saying like Oregonians but I decided not to. And so they can travel. So from ancient times they took these with them on their travels because they also last long. And I think those are good tings in a fruit. Last longs, to be tasty, have enough tough skin and yet not so tough that you can't just bite into it. And we're invited to be good fruit. It's just a teaser, something to think about. When you think about what it might mean for you to be good fruit for the Gospel of Jesus Christ. What does that mean to you? How might you live it out? And maybe it's not the pear for you, maybe it's some other fruit that you want to choose and maybe there's some other characteristics of fruit that you might pick up and say "That mean's something to me as I imagine what it means to be God's people in this world."

Now the saint we celebrate today is Alfred the Great. He is the only king in England ever to be called "the great". He lived around 800. Anybody guess why he was called the great? Anyone want to take a shot at that? Somebody say something about the Vikings and war? Yes. See, what was happening, the main thing was at the time that he became king all his brothers had been killed, mostly in the Viking raids, and he thought probably to himself, "Maybe we could have a different way of dealing with this." And he came up with a new way of warfare and it involved new plans to put fortifications in different places and have a mobile army that moved between them. And, of course, the first thing that they figured out when he started talking to the nobles about it was it wasn't going to be cheap. They were going to have to come up with men and money to make this thing work. So he had to really, really work hard to get the nobles behind him to do this because nobody knew if it would work. He was just trying something new. And he got their attention and he got their commitment and they built those fortifications and they were able to defend themselves.

The second thing that he did had to do with education. Now, he's not so noble and wise in this regard as we might hope for today because the only people he was really trying to educate were the landowners, the rulers, but he wanted good leaders and so he made sure that they had what they needed. He took the texts that were important for everyone to have and he translated them into English and he made sure that the leaders at least were thinking intelligently about how to move forward as a people.

The last thing he did was he reformed the legal system. The funny part is if you read his legal system apparently it's almost illegible and confusing and it doesn't relate in parts but what he did do was he got them to talk about fairness. That people ought to be treated the same, fair in their dealings with one another. I want to suggest to you that, see he's the only king that has ever been thought of as great and he was actually, although nobody ever called him "The king of the Anglo Saxons" it was attributed to him later. The reason was to build a strong foundation. He built something upon which England could build up.

We too are called by Jesus in our Gospel to build on strong foundations, to figure out what that foundation is to make it real powerful, not for the kingdom of this world like Alfred was, but for the kingdom of God. So we have to ask ourselves, what does it look like to have a strong foundation? It would take much longer than we have in this short sermon for us to really talk richly and deeply about everything that we might imagine. But, I do want to point out three things that I think are a part of the strong foundation that we need to work on.

The first is liturgy and I've been working on that with the clergy and people of this diocese. We've been learning how to sing. We had person come and talk to a bunch of the clergy over in Bend and one of the things he said is, "A singing church is a growing church." And we've gotta figure out how to do that. We gotta sing new songs, we gotta sing in ways that make not just us happy but others who aren't a part of us happy. This is probably the most difficult thing we struggle with. Sunday in and Sunday out I go to churches and sometimes I go to a church and I look there and everybody is older than I am. And my hair is pretty gray. And if you just look around and you see that, you think in twenty years what's left? What's left? Where are the kids, why aren't they with us? I don't have the answers to that question but I can tell you one thing, the youth of today haven't given up on God. And even though some people call this the "none" state, people haven't given up on faith and religion and God. The other day Marla and I got a new piano and they came in the house and the worker was there and he was doing the work of signing everything and getting it all done and I was wearing my collar because I had driven home to see the piano being brought in and the guy at the very end, a young guy's got a baseball cap on—it was not a team I particularly supported, but that's okay—got the baseball cap on and he looks at me and he says, "Are you a clergyman?" They get it. They're not sure what it means, they're not really sure if they want to be near us all the time, but they're interested. Why aren't they singing with us? Why aren't they with us? What does it mean to live into the kingdom of God? At the same time we've got people who have been in the Episcopal Church forever and they love every single old hymn we have ever sung and we'd just get rid of that they'll go, "Where did my church go?" And that's the challenge of every single music leader, every single priest, every single bishop and should be of every single lay person too. How do we make liturgy alive so that sometime in the liturgy we go "Ooo, God's here." That's a good thing. So liturgy. Liturgy only takes us so far.

Another piece to the puzzle is education. Because some of these symbols we use are a little ancient. And they're not readily understandable all the time, at least not in the forms we use them. I think one of the jokes I've always heard is, "The miracle isn't that Jesus is in the bread, the miracle is that that's really bread." Have you hear that one? We should break real bread, drink real wine. Be present to one another and they get it. We get it. We've gotta find a way to teach people what this kingdom of God is. It's as Sara [Miles] said, "Everybody knows what that kingdom of the world is and we know how to live in it because we do it every day and the world invites us into it, the world wants us to be there, and the world rewards for being in the kingdom

of this world." And it is very simple and seductive to say, "That's where I'm gonna be." And yet most of us haven't figured out that that world is hollow, that world is empty, that world is not the world of community, it is not the world of connection, it is not the world of love, it is not the world of being present to one another and to God's presence within us. So we've gotta figure out what it means to educate people and to invite them into this wonderful kingdom that we've experienced.

And the third thing is service. It's this Gospel Justice work we've been talking about. Because sometimes the best way to get to the Eucharist and liturgy and sometimes the way to get to God's presence in your life is through the simple acts of loving one another. This morning I got up early and went to Starbucks—it's one of my less great habits in the world—and I found a place in the corner away from everybody, I was having my coffee and there was a guy outside on the street and he had a bag and the bag had newspapers in it. Have you seen those people? And he would walk up and back with this bag and sometimes he'd be talking to himself and he'd just offer it to people. And most of the people just walked right by. They didn't look, they didn't want to see him. One person walked by and gave him a dollar bill. A few people went like this and said, "No." I was there for almost forty minutes and in those forty minutes he got one dollar bill. And every single person that walked by him had a dollar bill they could have given him. Now, I don't know if that's what you're called to. I don't even know if you like that particular way of doing service in the world. And I don't think everybody's called to the same thing. But, it shows you something about the brokenness of the world when you've seen someone whose life is structured in that way and when you imagine our own life, how it's structured. We gotta talk about how we're engaged in the world and this diocese is full of people who are engaged in ministry in the world. There are so many amazing, wonderful things that we're doing. And we are not the most prevalent religious body in Oregon. I'm suspecting that if you walked into any other church in this denomination you'd see this as well, but we're out there, we're reaching out, we're giving, we're sharing and we're beginning to invite them to be a part of us. Because as you know if all we're doing is giving that dollar bill and we're not engaging them in conversation, if we're not living into their life and understanding their life then we're putting a Band-Aid on something that needs something a lot more.

So this is just a beginning of the conversation. I'm hoping that we will have throughout this time, my prayer is that at the end of convention we will have had a rich conversation about what it means to live in the kingdom of God, we'll have an experience in this liturgy, and in the service we do, and in education, that we can learn a little bit more about what it is to live in the kingdom because that's where we all want to live in our most profound moments, we know it even though a lot of the time we spend in another sphere. Jesus said, "Why do you call me Lord, Lord? You do not do what I tell you." Think about that fruit, no matter which one you pick, the thing about the fruit is that no matter what its skin looks like, how rough it is, hopefully it's aged a little bit, but the good news is that the kingdom of God tastes extraordinary. Amen.

Report of the Board of Trustees

Board of Trustees Annual Report Diocese of Oregon Convention October 26, 2013

Right Reverend Sir and Delegates

I am pleased to be able to address you about the work of your Board of Trustees over this last year. In addition I am very pleased to introduce to you Stuart Morris, our new Treasurer. We express our gratitude to Mike Stone for his years of service.

The report is brief, but a number of important actions have been taken by the board which I know you will wish to hear about.

This year considerations were made where the board approved the use by St. David in Drain of their own financial resources for the Child Care remodel and granted St. Barnabas in Portland permission to sell four lots.

Other actions by the board, from funds held in trust by the board, include: \$6,500 for camper scholarships. Again this year we had a record number of kids who attended camp and we are grateful to the leadership of Beth Dieker and those of you in the diocese who volunteered as camp counselors and helpers.

A fourth year grant was made to St. David of Wales in Portland for \$40,000 to continue the renewal and growth needs of that parish. In terms of St. David's, a five year grant request was submitted four years ago and the Board annually reviews the progress of St. David's prior to making any additional yearly grant. I wish to, again, commend the Rev. Sara Fischer and the vestry and people of St. David's for their growth in both parish membership and also for the many community programs that are operated inside and outside of the parish.

Each year it is our task to make grants and loans to various parishes and organizations in the diocese. This year our funding actions included:

- Loan of \$37,000 to All Saints, Portland for roof repair
- Loan of \$20,000 and grant of \$20,000 to St. Andrew, Cottage Grove for roof repair
- Grant of \$8,000 to St. Barnabas, Portland for Architectural services
- Grant of \$60,000 over three years for clergy support at All Saints, Portland
- Funded \$33,000 for computer server replacement and new Payroll Software at the diocesan office

After thoughtful and thorough consideration the board made the decision to fund repairs to the Bishop's Close. A new boiler was installed, asbestos removed, and water abatement work which included the installation in the basement of eight sump pits with ejector pump as well as exterior work at a cost of \$153,000.

I wish to thank the retiring member of the board Marcia Kelly. I know that I speak for the board when I say that she has provided invaluable service and the board appreciates the gifts and abilities that Marcia has given. I am also retiring as a member of the board. It has been a privilege and pleasure to serve on the Board of Trustees.

Notes to Financial Statements December 31, 2010

NOTE 1 – PRINCIPAL ACTIVITY AND ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This summary of significant accounting policies of The Diocese of Oregon (the Diocese) is presented to assist in the understanding of the Organization's financial statements. The financial statements and notes are representations of management, who are responsible for their integrity and objectivity. The accounting policies used, unless otherwise noted, conform to the accounting basis prescribed by generally accepted accounting principles and have been consistently applied by management in the preparation of the financial statements in all material respects.

Organization's Activities - The Diocese of Oregon is a nonprofit, charitable and religious corporation, which administers the affairs of the Episcopal Church in Western Oregon.

Basis of Accounting - The financial statements of the Organization have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting and accordingly reflect all significant receivables, payables, and other liabilities. The balances do include some of the Mission Churches' and Parish Churches' assets and liabilities that are currently held by the Organization in trust.

Financial Statement Presentation – Financial statement presentation follows the recommendations of the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) No. 958-205 "Presentation of Financial Statements" of Not-for-Profit Entities. The Organization is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted, temporarily restricted, and permanently restricted. In addition, the Organization is required to present a statement of cash flows. The Organization has continued its use of fund accounting for internal purposes, however this information is reclassified for the financial statements to present the three classes of net assets.

- ... Unrestricted net assets Net assets not subject to donor-imposed restrictions.
- ... *Temporarily restricted net assets* Net assets subject to donor-imposed restrictions that will be met either by actions of the Organization and/or the passage of time.
- ... Permanently restricted net assets Net assets restricted by donors to be maintained in perpetuity. Generally, income earned on such funds is unrestricted or temporarily restricted based on donor stipulations.

Contributions - The Organization follows the recommendations of the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) No. 958-605-25 "Revenue Recognition," whereby contributions received are recorded as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted support depending on the existence and/or nature of any donor restrictions. Restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets upon satisfaction of the time or purpose of the restrictions.

Donated Assets - Donated marketable securities and other noncash donations are recorded as contributions at their estimated fair values at the date of donation.

Notes to Financial Statements December 31, 2010

NOTE 1 – PRINCIPAL ACTIVITY AND ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Cash and Cash Equivalents - For purposes of financial statement presentation, the Organization considers all money in the bank, interest-bearing investments purchased with original maturity dates of three months or less, and short-term marketable securities purchased with original maturity dates of two years or less as cash and cash equivalents. The cash equivalent investments and short-term marketable securities are comprised of U.S. Treasury Notes, Certificates of Deposits, and short-term Mutual Funds and are carried at market value in the statement of financial position. Unrealized gains and losses are included in the change in net assets in the accompanying statement of activities.

Diocesan Program Receivable - The Organization primarily funds its program services mostly through a levy on constituent churches of the Diocese. The levy is set canonically. The Diocesan Convention approves the annual budget of the Organization. The levy is self-assessed by constituent churches based upon monthly pledges, gifts, other income, and investment income for operational purposes. The allowance for doubtful accounts is based on management's evaluation of outstanding accounts receivable and is canonically limited. Program receivables over 90 days totaled \$903,720 at December 31, 2010.

Investments – Investments in marketable securities are presented in the financial statements at market value, with the resulting realized and unrealized gains and losses included in the statement of activities. Market value is determined by the quoted market price at the date of the statement of financial position. Security transactions and related expenses are accounted for on a trade-date basis.

Property and Equipment - Real estate purchases are reported at cost as they are acquired. Donated real estate is recorded at the fair market value as of the date of donation. Prior to December 31, 1986, the Organization was not required to capitalize real estate. Records regarding cost for real estate prior to 1986 were not available, so this real estate has been capitalized effective December 31, 1986, using insured values or estimated replacement cost. Depreciation is calculated on the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets which range from 15-39 years. Equipment and other short-lived fixed assets are expensed in the year purchased. When real estate assets are sold or otherwise disposed of, the related carrying value is cleared from the respective accounts and netted against any amount realized from disposition. Maintenance and repairs, including the replacement of minor items, are expense as incurred; major additions and betterments to real estate are capitalized.

Loans Secured by Real Estate - Loans receivable are primarily made to constituent churches to finance capital improvements and new real estate purchases. Authorization for loans and mortgages are granted by The Board of Trustees. Loans are reported at the amount of unpaid principal. The risk of loss on the real estate loans receivable is the balance due at the time of default, less any collateral that has been secured.

Notes to Financial Statements December 31, 2010

NOTE 1 – PRINCIPAL ACTIVITY AND ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Donated Services - No amounts have been reflected in the financial statements for donated services. The Organization generally pays for services requiring specific expertise. However, many individuals volunteer their time and perform a variety of tasks that assist the Organization with specific assistance programs and various committee assignments.

Use of Estimates - The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Compensated Absences - Employees of the Organization are entitled to paid vacations, sick days and other time off depending on job classification, length of service and other factors. It is impracticable to estimate the amount of compensation for future absences and, accordingly, no liability has been recorded in the accompanying financial statements. The Organization's policy is to recognize the costs of compensated absences when paid to employees.

Trusts - The Organization manages several trusts for other church organizations and has no interest in trust or principle and the investments are not included in these financial statements.

Income Taxes - The Diocese of Oregon is exempt from both Federal and Oregon income taxes under IRC §501(c)(3) and ORS 65. Accordingly, no provision for federal or state income taxes has been recorded in the accompanying financial statements.

Subsequent Events – Management has evaluated subsequent events through October 24, 2012, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

NOTE 4 – LOANS RECEIVABLE

Loans receivable consists of real estate loans granted to Mission and Parish Churches, in which the Organization is the lender of the loans. Loans are made to finance capital improvements and new real estate purchases. Authorization for loans and mortgages are granted by The Board of Trustees. Loans are reported at the amount of unpaid principal. The risk of loss on the real estate loans receivable is the balance due at the time of default, less any collateral that has been secured.

On November 9, 2000, the Board of Trustee passed a motion to hold in abeyance the payments on the Portland, St. Gabriel Pier Estate loan receivable.

NOTE 5 - LONG TERM INVESTMENTS

At year-end all long-term investments, including those held on behalf of others, consist of shares in the Diocesan Investment Fund (a master trust) of Diocese of Oregon. The fund is administered by the Diocese with the aggregate of pooled securities divided by units and allocated to pool members based on cash and securities contributed plus reinvested earnings. The cash and securities are held in custody by U.S. Bank Trust, acting on behalf of the individual fund managers, subject to the direction of The Diocese of Oregon. Investment income and expenses, including realized and unrealized gains and losses, are classified as investment income to the total amount of long term investment is segregated as follows:

NOTE 6 - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

FASB ASC No. 820-10 "Fair Value Measurements", establishes a framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820-10 are described below:

- Level 1 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Diocese has the ability to access.
- Level 2 Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;

Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;

Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;

Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2010.

Money Market: Valued at the net asset value ('NAV") of shares held by the Diocese at year end.

Common Stock: Valued at the closing price reported on the active market on which the individual securities are traded.

NOTE 6 – FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS (Continued)

Mutual Funds: Valued at the net asset value ('NAV") of shares held by the Diocese at year end.

Investment in Partnership: Valued on the equity method accounting; whereby, the initial investment is increased or decreased based on the investment's annual income (loss) activity.

Real Estate: Contributed property is carried at its net realizable value, which approximated fair value.

The methods described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Diocese believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

NOTE 7 – ENDOWMENT

The Diocese's endowment consists of approximately twenty individual funds established for a variety of purposes. Its endowment includes both donor-restricted endowment funds and funds designated by the Board of Trustees to function as endowments. As required by GAAP, net assets associated with endowment funds, including funds designated by the Board of Trustees to function as endowments, are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions.

The Board of Trustees of the Diocese has interpreted the State Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (SPMIFA) as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor-restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, the Diocese classifies as permanently restricted net assets (a) the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment, (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the permanent endowment, and (c) accumulations to the permanent endowment made in accordance with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument at the time the accumulation is added to the fund. The remaining portion of the donor-restricted endowment fund that is not classified in permanently restricted net assets is classified as temporarily restricted net assets until those amounts are appropriated for expenditure by the organization in a manner consistent with the standard of prudence prescribed by SPMIFA. In accordance with SPMIFA, the organization considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds:

NOTE 8 – FUNDS HELD FOR OTHERS

The Organization holds investment funds for several of its Mission Churches, Parish Churches, and other affiliated groups. The holdings are with recourse and are expected to be repaid to the churches and affiliated groups in the future. As of December 31, 2010, the total amount of funds held for others is \$21,447,584 and includes the estimated net earnings and expenses incurred on these holdings. This liability is considered long-term because the corresponding investments are classified as such, even though the holdings may be called at any time by the churches and affiliated groups after giving 30 days notice.

NOTE 9 – PENSION PLAN

Separate pension plans are maintained for clergy and lay employees. The pension plan for clergy is a defined benefit plan administered by the Church Pension Fund. Lay employees may choose between a defined benefit pension or a defined contribution pension plan both administered by the Church Life Insurance Company. These pension trusts are national plans servicing employees of the Episcopal Church. If an employee moves and begins Episcopal employment within another Episcopal institution, the ability to participate in the plans is retained. These plans are exempt from the provisions of ERISA.

All stipendiary clergy must be covered by the Church Pension Fund. Annual contributions by the Organization are determined as 18% of their Total Compensation Package.

All lay employees who have worked one year with a minimum of 1,000 hours of service are eligible to participate in the plan. Annual contributions by the Organization are determined at 9% of their gross wages. Under the defined contribution plan, the Organization makes annual contributions equal to 5% of all participants' compensation, and will match participants' contributions to the plan up to 4% of their compensation. Lay employees vest after five years of accredited service with the Episcopal Church. During the year ended December 31, 2010, the total cost recognized for pension plans was \$92,578, and was included in employee benefits.

NOTE 10 – LEASE AGREEMENTS

The Organization leases a vehicle, a postage machine, a copier, and a facility which are due to expire at various dates through July 31, 2015. Rent expense under such leases totaled \$48,726 for the year ended December 31, 2010 which includes a negotiated lease buyout of a facility lease for \$9,194.

NOTE 12 – CONCENTRATIONS OF CREDIT RISK

Financial instruments, which potentially expose the Organization to concentrations of credit risk, consist primarily of cash and cash equivalents. Cash is deposited with institutions insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC). At December 31, 2010, the Organization's uninsured cash balances totaled \$2,119,703.

Cash equivalents consist of money market funds that are invested with institutions covered by the Securities Investor Protection Corporation (SIPC). The SIPC insures investments up to \$500,000 with a maximum of \$100,000 in cash. At December 31, 2010, the Organization's uninsured cash balances totaled \$0.

Investments held in trust with US Bank are not covered under Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) or Securities Investor Protection Corporation (SIPC) programs. As per the trust agreement, the assets do not become assets or liabilities of the bank and are segregated from the bank's assets. The bank acts as trustee to the account and, in this connection, provides investment management, investment advice and other services to the account. Account ownership remains vested in the individuals or entities for whose benefit the bank is acting as trustee and the assets are not subject to the claims of creditors

The Organization has not experienced any losses in such accounts and believes it is not exposed to any significant credit risk on cash and cash equivalents.

Endowment Funds were established for the purpose of providing investment revenues to support Diocesan programs in perpetuity. Investment income is distributed quarterly from these funds to general fund.

NOTE 15 – PRIOR PERIOD ADJUSTMENT

Net assets at the beginning of 2010 have been adjusted. Amounts designated as permanently restricted investments for the Good Sam Foundation (the Foundation) were incorrectly treated as assets owned by the Diocese. In communications received from the Foundation, these investments are owned by the Foundation and The Diocese acts only as a custodian holding the funds in the DIF account. Assets held on behalf of others were understated by the amount of \$345,536 relating to the improper recognition of investments owned by the Foundation. In the process of conducting the Diocese's annual audit, the internal accounting function determined that various small other Funds Held on Behalf of Others were overstated by the amount of \$27,872.

Had these errors not been made, the net increase in net assets for the year ended December 31, 2009 would have decreased by \$57,978 related to investment gains earned on these accounts. The net effect of this error correction decreases the beginning balance of net assets by \$317,664.

NOTE 16 – SUBSEQUENT EVENT

Subsequent to the balance sheet date, the Diocese sold the Triangle Lake Center property for approximately \$1.3 million dollars in August 2011.
