Call to Order

The Rt. Rev. Michael J. Hanley, Bishop of Oregon, called the convention to order at 9:08 a.m.

Welcoming Remarks

Bishop Hanley welcomed delegates and guests, especially the Rev. Dave Brauer-Reike, Bishop of the Oregon Synod, ELCA, who was our Keynote speaker later today. We also welcomed the Rt. Rev. Bob Ladehoff who shares with Bishop Hanley in this Episcopal ministry in the Diocese of Oregon.

Point of Personal Privilege for Chancellor Paul Dakpolos

Chancellor Dakopolos announced that he will be resigning as Chancellor in 2017 after nine years. He was appointed by Bishop Itty and served during the transition and election of Bishop Hanley. He stated that our diocese is precious, worthy of nurture, worthy of kindness, prayer and forgiveness and we will save ourselves through prayer, faithfulness, and forgiveness. He thanked Bishop Hanley, the M & M Sisters (the Rev. Margaret McMurren and Mary Cramer), and Sharon Rodgers for their leadership during the time of transition. Bishop Hanley presented him with the Bishop's Cross Award. The convention rose in a standing ovation in thanks to Chancellor Dakopolos for his years of dedicated service to the Diocese of Oregon.

Latino Ministry Report presented by Missioner, the Rev. Roberto Arciniega

Padre Arciniega brought greetings and prayers from the Diocese of Cuernavaca. Five churches have begun pairings with churches in Cuernavaca: St. Mary's, Eugene with Ascension, Cuernavaca; Holy Cross/Santa Cruz, Boring with Santa Cruz, Cuernavaca; Todos al Santos, Hillsboro with El Espiritu Santos, Cuernavaca; SS. Peter & Paul, Portland with San Pablo, Cuernavaca; St. Michael & All Angels, Portland with San Miguel, Cuernavaca. Starting next year we will begin Escuela de Ministerio at the Academy, a two-year course for ministry and lay leaders in the Latino community. He expressed this thanks to the convention for making this possible.

Camping & Youth Ministry Report presented by the Rev. Canon Carol Sedlacek

Carol Sedlacek highlighted the great work with youth and young adults with our camping ministry and thanked Jonathan Potter who put together a video presentation from camp this past summer. The diocesan youth trip this past August was a Mission Trip to St. Luke in the Ballard District of Seattle which has a feeding ministry called Edible Hope. This is a group of women who have felt called to feed the people and the youth helped with this program. They also spent a day at St. Paul's in Seattle and helped work on their labyrinth. Fifteen youth from seven different congregations and four adults from four. EYE, The Episcopal Youth Event is next July in Oklahoma.

Report of Campus Ministry was presented by the Revs. Abigail Buckely, Marlene Mutchler, Doug Hale, and Zachary Harmon.

Doug Hale is the chaplain for Lane Community College and the U of O House where they have a student residence and pantry for students. Nicholas Ertsgaard just started at Western Compass, an ecumenical ministry at Western Oregon University. Zac Harmon has started a ministry at the campus of Willamette University. Marlene Mutchler is chaplain to the Portland Metro area campuses, primarily PSU but with students from others. Abigail Buckley, Oregon State at Corvallis is serving through Good Samaritan Parish. The campus chaplains asked the members of convention to send

them contact information for students from their churches and families.

BE IT RESOLVED THAT THE revisions of the Constitution and Canons of the Episcopal Diocese of Oregon, November 2013, be approved, with the proviso that the revisions not take effect until approved again (in a 2/3 majority vote by orders) at the Convention in 2017.

The constitutional revision was considered article by article.

Motion to Amend Article 7, Section 2: Delete "next" and add "then" on the first line to read: The Convention shall then elect the same number of Clergy and Lay Alternates. Second. Discussion. Amendment adopted.

Bishop Michael Hanley presented the second Bishop's Cross award in absentia to Inga Dubay:

In 1973, when James Carman was Bishop of Oregon Master Calligrapher and Artist Inga Dubay created the first ordination certificate for Neff Powell. In the years since that time, according to the Ordination Register, she has created 306 ordination certificates for Deacons and Priests. We are pleased to see that there are still 78 priests and deacons present in the diocese who were the recipients of these magnificent and meaningful certificates. Some of those members of the clergy were able to bring their certificates. Even though Bishop Neff Powell was not able to be present his spouse Dorothy brought Neff's certificate for him. We are grateful for your ministry through her art and I know that these certificates are treasured by those who have received them.

Motion to Amend Article 7, Section 1: to add the following after "and four lay Deputies": using the electoral standards set out in this Constitution and Canons. Second. Discussion. Amendment adopted.

Motion to Amend: the text of Article 20 of the Constitution of the Diocese of Oregon, 2013, be restored to the 2016 proposed revision of. The Constitution and Canons. The words "Article 9" in Article 20 be stricken and replaced with "Article 4, section 11". Current Article 20 be numbered Article 14; new Article 14 be numbered Article 15; and, new Article 15 be numbered Article 16. Second. Discussion. Amendment was defeated.

Motion to Amend Article 4, Section 4: Sentence be amended: Every member of the Clergy who is canonically resident in the Diocese who is ecclesiastically employed or appointed by the Bishop in the Diocese or resident

within it shall have a seat and voice in the Convention. Second. Discussion. Amendment adopted.

Motion to adopt the revision of the Constitution of the Episcopal Diocese of Oregon Passed. Will lie over for approval by a 2/3 majority vote by orders at the Convention in 2017.

2017 Budget

Dick Zeller, chair of the Committee on Program and Budget of the Diocesan Council presented the 2017 budget. Motion to Amend: Increase line 1 DPA Adjustment by an additional \$23,609 for a total of \$145,124. Second. Amendment Passed. It was moved, seconded, and passed to adopt the budget (see appendix, page 53).

Ecumenical Commission

The Rev. Carolynne Fairweather, convener, presented the Ecumenical Commission Banner of Distinction to the Church of the Resurrection in Eugene for their work with unhoused neighbors by allowing cars to park in their lot. They are building a hospitality village with three Conestoga huts and also have a starter kit ministry for those moving into permanent housing.

Commission on Poverty and Homelessness

Jeanne Kaliszewski, convener of the Commission on Poverty and Homelessness, presented the report. Due to the generosity of the Thanksgiving Offering and basket raffle of which there were 53 baskets donated and well over \$3,000 collected. Please remember the Thanksgiving Offering where the commission receives the bulk of their support with St. David of Wales in Portland providing 1/3 of the total funds. 100% given back to Congregations for the good work they are doing in their communities. She highlighted a new program The Power of Prayer at St. George in Roseburg which created a partnership with a shelter that housed women who were vulnerable in that community.

Report on Episcopal Relief & Development and the 2106 Outreach Project

Archdeacon Carter Hawley. Episcopal Relief & Development Coordinator reported that for 75 years Episcopal Relief & Development has been alleviating hunger, creating opportunity and responding to disasters both locally and overseas. Highlights for the year on the Diocese of Oregon include local disaster response and preparedness, asset mapping, and 25 confirmed Episcopal Relief & Development coordinators in parishes. The 2016 Outreach Project of Episcopal Relief & Development is the Microfinance Program: Pennies to Prosperity Economic Opportunities Fund with 16 churches participating so far for a total of \$8,854. This did not include any funds churches sent directly to Episcopal Relief & Development. For 2017 the diocese will be working to determine an outreach project to be announced.

Report from Standing Rock

The Revs. Jeremy Lucas and James Joiner reported on their journey to Standing Rock in North Dakota and led the convention in table discussion on the topic of Standing Rock and the North Dakota Access Pipeline.

Global Mission

The Rev. Jim Boston reported that there will be a Global Mission Event at St. Thomas in Eugene on Saturday, April 22, 2017. The main speaker will be a Young Adult Service Corp Volunteer.

This corporation is a Corporation Sole, represented by the Bishop and his successors in office, in perpetuity. A convenient legal depository of funds and property held for the benefit of the Church. The funds are administered by the Bishop and invested in the Diocese of Oregon Pooled Investment Fund.

"THE DIOCESE OF OREGON"

The Church in this Diocese is incorporated under the name of The Diocese of Oregon, 11800 SW Military Lane, Portland, Oregon 97219. The corporation holds in trust all property given for objects connected with the Church in this Diocese other than property held by parochial or other corporations. The Bishop and the Officers and Board of Trustees, elected by the Diocesan Convention, administer the funds.

"LEGACY GOOD SAMARITAN HOSPITAL AND MEDICAL CENTER"

A part of the Legacy Health System, this nonprofit corporation controls, manages and operates Legacy Good Samaritan Hospital and Medical Center, 1015 NW 22nd Avenue, Portland, Oregon 97210. The Bishop and one Director, elected by Diocesan Convention, serve on the Legacy Health System Board of Directors.

"GOOD SAMARITAN HOSPITAL CORVALLIS"

This nonprofit corporation controls, manages and operates the Good Samaritan Hospital Corvallis, 3600 NW

Samaritan Drive, Corvallis, Oregon 97339. The Bishop is the Chairman of the Board of Directors and appoints two additional Board members.

"SAMARITAN VILLAGE"

This nonprofit corporation controls, manages and operates Samaritan Village, 285 NW 35th Street, Corvallis, Oregon 97330, the retirement facility sponsored by The Diocese of Oregon. This facility has been in operation since September 1, 1962 and continues to operate at full capacity, with a short waiting list. The Bishop is President of the Board of Trustees.

"OREGON EPISCOPAL SCHOOL"

This nonprofit corporation controls, manages and operates Oregon Episcopal School, a school for boys and girls, formerly known as St. Helen's Hall and Bishop Dagwell Hall, at 6300 SW Nicol Road, Portland, Oregon 97223. The Bishop serves as Chairman of the Board and Episcopal Trustees serve three-year terms on a rotation basis.

"CENTER FOR COMMUNITY COUNSELING"

This nonprofit corporation controls, manages and operates the Center for Community Counseling, 1465 Coburg Road, Eugene, Oregon 97401, a counseling agency. The Bishop appoints one member of the Board of Directors.

Appendix

Environmental Commission Report

Good Afternoon. I'm Peter Sergienko from St. Michael & All Angels in Portland and convener of the Environmental Commission. Let us pray.

Loving God, who birthed creation from the nothingness of space, kindling life where all was empty, turning chaos into grace: when we feel confused and fruitless, dawn upon our restless night; give us faith's imagination, hope's renewing, love's delight.

Amen.

This prayer is the third verse of a hymn we sang at St. Michael's last Sunday.

Although I love the imagery of this entire verse, the words that most speak to me are "give us faith's imagination."

In reporting to you, and announcing our Environmental Award recipient, I'm going to briefly explore the concept of "faith's imagination."

I think "faith's imagination" is mostly about the primacy of metaphor and story. The other part is about evangelism.

To live fully into our baptismal covenants we must weave our personal stories of death and resurrection, transformation, grace, and love into the competing stories and narratives that dominate popular culture, such as wealth, power, violence, and fear.

If we fail to do this, we're missing out on a critical part of our holy relationship with God. We are Christ's body in the world. Our non-Episcopalian brothers and sisters need to hear some stories from the Episcopal branch of the Jesus Movement.

This weaving process won't be easy or pretty. If this election season has done nothing else, it has exposed some major flaws in our culture's foundational stories. Do we still believe that economies must grow no matter the cost? That we can continue to extract and burn fossil fuels with only minimal constraints? That all value must be measured in monetary terms? That we must sacrifice environmental protection for jobs? That poor people are primarily and morally responsible for their station in life? That our criminal justice systems treat people of color equally?

These questions all occurred to me in connection with the conflict at Standing Rock. Let's take a minute to unpack them in this context.

The Dakota Access Pipeline was initially a routine project. It received little attention until it was re-routed to cross the Missouri River near the Standing Rock Sioux reservation. This was done to protect Bismarck and its residents from unacceptable environmental risks.

In early September, pipeline construction disturbed sacred Native American burial grounds near Standing Rock. Within hours of learning of legal efforts to protect the site, the pipeline's owner literally plowed ahead, ordering armed guards to protect bulldozers that proceeded to desecrate the sacred land.

Efforts by the Standing Rock Sioux to defend their rights in court and to protect their water and land through non-violent civil disobedience have been met with an overwhelming, militarized, and violent response by the state government. The Sioux are justifiably outraged.

What does it say about our culture when our legal systems favor private and dangerously polluting economic interests over human access to clean water?

What did we think when the Taliban destroyed ancient, sacred religious sites? What does this story of desecrated native burial grounds say about our culture now?

What does it mean for our government to deny tribal and individual constitutional rights to protest?

In the words of Presiding Bishop Curry, there has to be a better way.

Our church leaders have engaged with these questions by naming the injustices at Standing Rock as a moral concern of the church. Several hundred Episcopal clergy traveled to Standing Rock this week to support our native brothers and sisters. Our church has acknowledged historical systems of oppression, domination, and discrimination, lamented the continuation of these systems into the present day, and demanded change. We've also taken a stand for the dignity of all God's children regardless of race, gender, economic status, sexual orientation, gender identity, or disability. All of this is a beautiful expression of our faithful imagination.

The transition away from a fossil fuel economy is truly a small part of the Standing Rock story. But if we treat this transition as a technology shift only, a chance to install solar and wind and to develop more efficient batteries, we're missing the boat. Our old and decaying cultural stories will still be weighing us down. We need a transformative process. We need to replace the stories that no longer work with faithfully imagined stories of grace, redemption, and justice, grounded in God's love for all the Creation. We need to faithfully imagine a post fossilfuel economy that serves all people.

In this time of transition and transformation, the Environmental Commission seeks congregational partners striving for environmental sustainability and justice. This year's Environmental Award winner, St. Andrew and All Souls, Portland, is one such partner.

St. Andrew's is committed to environmental stewardship throughout its ministry and activities. St. Andrew's has thoughtfully and comprehensively minimized waste and maximized efficiency in conducting the Hereford House Food Pantry, its signature outreach ministry that serves 900 clients each month. That's faithful imagination.

St. Andrew's is also undertaking a comprehensive planning process to make the best possible use of its property and buildings. These plans include a proposal to build affordable apartments on its campus while incorporating practices to minimize construction waste and manage stormwater creatively to prevent pollution and purify water. That's faithful imagination.

Finally, I know St. Andrew's Vicar, Karen Ward, mostly through Facebook. If you're not Karen's Facebook friend you should be. Karen is a voracious reader and thoughtful commentator on numerous justice issues. She explains and shares articles and information that have enriched my understanding of racial and environmental justice among other things.

As we move into new understandings of environmental stewardship, engaging with public policies and the values those policies reflect, we need leaders like Karen. Leaders who adeptly, compassionately, and relentlessly, challenge the comfortable and familiar stories we tell ourselves. And leaders who push us forward to a more faithfully imagined just and sustainable future.

Board of Trustees Report

In 1999 I got to hear a couple named john and Sylvia Ronsvalle talk about money, they wrote a book called Behind the Stained Glass Window and they give every year a report called the State of Church Giving. They defined money as stored time and talent. What they said is every dollar bill, every piece of money that we have, is stored up time and talent either from ourselves or from someone else that we got it from. We go out and we give our God-given life energy to a thing and, hopefully, many times people give us something in return like that piece of paper or that check that we get for going to work. And that's always been something that has stuck with me every time that I'm put in a place that I'm responsible for money.

The Board of Trustees of the Diocese of Oregon holds the fiduciary responsibility to oversee the financial operations along with the Bishop of this diocese. Fiduciary means that we build a relationship of trust between you and the diocese. And what we have been doing over this last year is working nonstop to build that trust in a way so that you know when you personally or your congregation send your money, your life energy, your God-given spirit that you have put into those dollar bills, when you send that to the diocese of Oregon you can be assured that all of that money is being used well and in complete agreement with the best financial practices of nonprofits in our world. That's what we've been working on. Over the last year, as you have heard from our Treasurer Stuart Morris, you know that right now we have audits that have been completed for this diocese from 2011 through 2015. Four of those were approved in the last 18months so we are up to speed on that. And the Board of Trustees has been pushing hard to make sure that we know so that you know that you can trust that life spirit that you are sending to the diocese.

We have engaged the services of two separate outside financial consultants to come in and help us look from top to bottom of all of the financial operations of this diocese and I can tell you without any reservation that this diocese is in a great financial place right now. We know more about everything that's going on than maybe has ever been known in this diocese before. When I stepped on to the Board of Trustees somebody told me that in 2008 we were still keeping paper records that everything was being put in on a ledger. Now were moving up to some of the most up-to-date and up- to-speed nonprofit financial record keeping that is available today. And we are very, very proud of that.

What we also know is that now that we know everything that's going on the Board of Trustees has stepped fully into its other responsibilities and at least one of those responsibilities is giving away money and we have enjoyed that. I have really enjoyed watching our Board of Trustees give money away to the Oregon State campus ministries, Good Samaritan, and watching us help congregations all over this diocese do the things that they need help to do, helping with their bricks and their mortars, the buildings that might be in disarray. We can do that, that's our job, that's what all of those good people have given their money into the diocese for us to be responsible for. And so we continue with that.

One of the other great responsibilities over this last year was to help take names and encourage people to stand on the Stakeholders Advisory Committee for our Investment Committee. So that those who have concerns and cares about ethical investment in our world, which I know you do, can know that your voices are being heard so that that committee can bring those thoughts and concerns and prayers to the Board of Trustees so we can make decisions with our money with our life that reflect our values. So I can tell as I step off of the Board of Trustees this year I am so proud to have served with all those who are on the board, with the bishop, with the staff, wonderful, wonderful work has been going on and I know that it will continue. Please keep the Board of Trustees and all commissions and committees in this diocese in your prayers, they need them. I will be praying extra hard for all of these committees now that I've been on one. So I want to say thank you, thank you Bishop for allowing me to serve, thank you to this convention and those of you who entrusted me with this responsibility, and thank you to all of you who serve in the future in this diocese on behalf of the Board of Trustees. God Bless.

Report of the Treasurer

I extend my thanks to Bishop Hanley for backing the plans to revamp the Diocese accounting system bringing it into the 21st century. With the Bishops support he has made it possible to complete the audits of 2012 – 2015.

For the first time in decades the Diocese of Western Oregon have current and timely audited financial statements to present to convention. The audited financial statements for 2015 will be submitted to the Bishop and the Board of Trustees at their regular November Board meeting for acceptance. In addition to the financial audit of 2015 being completed in the past year the financial audits of 2012 through 2015 were also completed and accepted by the Board of Trustees.

By having the audits now up to date and a new accounting system, we can now focus our attention on the needs of the Diocese of Western Oregon and move forward with plans for the future.

Bishop Michael Hanley's Address

Good morning. It is good to be with you here in Eugene Oregon at the 128th Convention of the Episcopal Church in Western Oregon. Our theme for this convention is Every Blessing and indeed we have many blessings in this great diocese. I want to start the address, however, at the level of the wider Episcopal Church in the United States and around the world.

Recently our Presiding Bishop, Michael Curry was asked to go a bit deeper in explaining just what he has been talking about when he has claimed that we are the Episcopal Branch of the Jesus Movement. Bishop Curry made a video about this and shared it at the September meeting of the House of Bishops. It can be found on the site for the Episcopal News Service but I'd like to share it with you now. [Video]

"Someone once said: When you look at Jesus, you see one who is loving, one who is liberating, and one who is life-giving." This, Bishop Curry proclaims, is what Jesus was all about and it is what the movement in the name of Jesus is all about.

It is about loving God and neighbor, liberating those in captivity and living in ways that are life-giving. This is the Jesus Movement and Michael goes on to say that at the level of the Wider Episcopal Church we have committed ourselves in this triennium to living out this life in three primary areas: In our relationship with God we evangelize, spreading the good news of God to those who are in need of God's love. In our relationships with each other we seek reconciliation and in the wider church this is focused on racial reconciliation. And finally in our relationship with all of God's creation we seek to be good stewards of our environment.

Can you see yourself and your congregation in this vision of the Episcopal Branch of the Jesus Movement? I suspect that you can and I believe that in the diocese of Oregon we are striving for this same vision of a world that is loving, that is liberating and that is life-giving.

In the politically charged atmosphere of the United States today we see a very different vision of our world. It is up to us, the followers of Jesus Christ to proclaim, in word and action, a message of justice, of love, and of the mercy of God to this world which seems so often ready to exclude the other, to condemn that which is different, and to protect ourselves at the expense of others. The politics of hate and exclusion must not be allowed to win the day. It is contrary to the way of Jesus.

Let me share with you how I see the Jesus Movement being lived out in the congregations of the diocese of Oregon. To do this I have created this basket of blessings that you see on this table. After this session of the Convention I will be adding this basket to the other baskets on raffle out in the display area.

So, let's see what we have here:

First: Loving: Ministries of Worship and Evangelism.

We begin with a bottle of wine. Symbolic of the blood of Jesus poured out for the life of the world. As I think at the churches of the diocese I could chose any of them to talk about how we model the love of God in worship. Whether we gather with hundreds in Cathedral like services or a remnant few, fill a small sanctuary, week in and week out the congregations of this diocese make it their goal to offer to God a time of holiness and prayer in services on Sunday mornings, Sunday afternoons and various weekday offerings. Clergy and lay preachers share the good news of God's love and compassion, Musicians help us to sing the praises of God, (and to symbolize this I have included a Music CD from the Cathedral). Many others do the extensive behind the scenes work that allow these congregational services to be times of holiness.

Evangelism is also about how we teach the faith to those who show up at our doors and how we seek to know Christ as savior and servant of all. For this I have chosen to include in the basket a book on Benedictine monastic life. I do this because I have found personal life in this tradition and because many in the diocese follow a Benedictine pattern of life as well. As example I offer the Cornerstone Community of Trinity Cathedral. This is a group of laity and clergy from a number of Episcopal churches who have made a commitment to this life and have chosen to gather weekly in small groups and who covenant to be in prayer and study together.

In these and many other ways we in the diocese are a community of love and prayer reaching out to the world in worship and evangelism.

Next: liberating: Ministries of care and compassion.

Let me begin with this Mexican pitcher which puts me in mind of the companion relationship we have with the Journal of the 128th Convention

diocese of Cuernavaca. I begin here because this ministry is a true two way street. We offer to Cuernavaca workshops done by the Rev. Roberto Archiniega and a chance to enrich their language programs and we receive from the diocese of Cuernavaca a much needed Spanish emergence program and the ability to learn to live more fully into the diversity that is the world stage.

I am also mindful of the great cultural experience that John and Alice Scannell have been involved with in Cuernavaca for years. Another example of how one good idea has enriched the lives of many in this diocese. Truly an example of how we liberate others and are ourselves liberated in the process.

This breadboard is included in my basket of many blessings because of all of the feeding ministries that are a part of the diocese of Oregon. One example of this is the ministry of Clay Street table. This is a ministry housed in St. Stephen's in Portland and is described on their website as follows:

At St. Stephen's, we believe in feeding the body and the spirit; that's why we're home to the Clay Street Community Table, a coalition of organizations dedicated to providing food and companionship to those in need. All are welcome at our meals and pantry program, which provided more than 49, 000 meals to the community last year. Another ministry of care and compassion that has several expressions in the diocese is that of our prison ministries. I have included a candle in the basket to symbolize this ministry in all of its fullness.

On our website that ministry is described as follows:

Members of the diocese are currently engaged in direct ministry to inmates of Multnomah county Jail, Lane County jail, Coffee Creek Correctional institution, rogue valley youth Correctional Facility and McClaren Youth Correctional Facility. They join with members of other churches to serve families of inmates through Kairos Outside. The prison Ministry is working with Ecumenical Ministries of Oregon and Partnership for Safety and Justice to address needed reforms to the criminal justice system.

These ministries are surely a light in a very dark place.

Finally: Life-giving: ministries of environmental stewardship

I've added to the basket an amaryllis plant, symbol of the world in which we live and to which we have a responsibility. Why this particular plant? Well, they bloom in the winter and we love them in our own home! I could have chosen almost any growing thing but I really do like bulbs that start as nothing much and grow to such great beauty. It is what I hope for the world in the future.

In the Diocese of Oregon we have a great Environmental commission and I hope you will take time to visit the website and check is out. Its mission is stated like this:

The Commission's mission is:

- To inspire the Diocese to celebrate the beauty, mystery, sacredness and generosity of God's creation.
- To raise awareness both within and outside the Church on the urgency and importance of caring for the environment.
- To educate the members of the Episcopal Church in Western Oregon about current environmental issues, and how those issues effect the continued livability of our region and our world.
- To emphasize models of ministry that incorporate protection, preservation, and sustainable use of God's creation.

The last item in this basket is an Icon of the Holy Trinity. It is the gift I give occasionally to clergy in the diocese when they are installed as rector or vicar in a congregation. I've included it because it is a symbol for me of the totality of God and of God's presence among us. I have in the last few minutes noted a few of the things we do in the diocese as Loving, liberating and Life-giving children of God. I could obviously have chosen many other things to talk about. We have active ministries in safe church and diverse church teaching, our commission to end racism is fully engaged in the life of the church and we offer many other great ways to be the Episcopal Branch of the Jesus movement. The Icon reminds me that there is just too much to talk about in a single speech. Before I end this opening address I want to say a word about where we are structurally in the diocese at this time. The diocese of Oregon is currently undergoing a significant time of transition and change.

Months ago Barb Ross our children's and youth coordinator retired and we have changed that position by having the Rev. Carol Sedlacek add much of Barb's work to her portfolio along with the camping ministry work she was already doing. I am grateful to Carol for her work in these areas.

Recently J.T. Quanbeck also retired as our communication officer and we have hired Heidi Pitts to continue this

work. Heidi is poised to significantly improve our online presence.

Months ago the Board of Trustee's began an overhaul of the finance department and we continue that work with the non-profit financial consultants we have hired to assist us. I believe in the end we will see a significant improvement in this department in the year ahead.

One other significant change did not occur. Neysa Ellgren Shepley offered her gifts in the search for a new bishop in the diocese Spokane Washington. Neysa was not elected to that office and so she has returned to Oregon.

While I know there is some pain associated with this outcome for you Neysa, please know that I and many others are glad you are with us.

This is a time of good strong positive movement in the diocese and I am proud of the work of the Diocesan Council, the Standing Committee and the Board of Trustees. I am proud also of the work of the committees and commissions of the diocese. The Commission on Ministry continues to assist those w3ho are in discernment for holy orders and the Stakeholders Advisory Committee has put in a great deal of time helping the diocese make smart choices concerning the investment of our financial resources. These are exciting times.

Our Episcopal Foundation is granting to congregations and related institutions much needed funding for new ventures in ministry.

OES, our Episcopal private preschool through high school is at the height of its game, having just built a 17 million dollar lower school. They are indeed, educating students so that they have the ability to use their power for good.

William Temple House, our Episcopal affiliated social service agency is also doing great creative work with the poor and needy of Portland. All of our 71 congregations offer services that reach out to people in need throughout the western half of the state of Oregon. This diocese is indeed engaged in the work of bringing the gospel message of love and compassion to a broken world.

We engage in ministries of poverty and homelessness, environmental degradation, gun violence, LGBTQ issues, the challenges of conflict in the Middle East and around the world as well as domestic terrorism and crimes of abuse.

Week in and week out I am privileged to invite into our communities those who come to the Episcopal Church seeking the Episcopal Branch of the Jesus movement. In the words of presiding Bishop Michael Curry: "And (this) my friends, can change this world. Putting Jesus at the center, loving, liberating, life giving.

Relationships with God: Evangelism.
Relationships with Each other: Reconciliation.
And with all of God's creation: Environmental stewardship.

Revisions to the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese of Oregon

CONSTITUTION OF THE DIOCESE OF OREGON

ARTICLE 1 TITLE AND BOUNDARIES OF THE DIOCESE

This Diocese shall be known as the Diocese of Oregon, and shall include that part of the State of Oregon lying west of the crest of the Cascade Mountains, including Benton, Clackamas, Clatsop, Columbia, Coos, Curry, Douglas, Jackson, Josephine, Lane, Lincoln, Linn, Marion, Multnomah, Polk, Tillamook, Washington, and Yamhill counties.

ARTICLE 2 ACCEDING TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH

- (a) The Diocese of Oregon accedes to the Constitution and Canons of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, otherwise known as The Episcopal Church, which is a part of Christ's Holy Catholic Church, and recognizes the authority of its General Convention.
- (b) This Constitution is the fundamental law of this Diocese under and in subordination to the Constitution and Canons of The Episcopal Church.

ARTICLE 3 AUTHORITY

- Sec. 1. The authority of this Diocese is vested in the Bishop Diocesan, the Bishop Coadjutor (if there be one), the Convention, the Standing Committee, and the Board of Trustees.
- Sec. 2. The Bishop Diocesan is the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese, unless the Bishop Diocesan or the Presiding Bishop has authorized another to act as Ecclesiastical Authority under the canons of The Episcopal Church.
- Sec. 3. The Bishop is the Ordinary of all religious and benevolent organizations of the Church within this Diocese, and as such is a member ex officio of their governing bodies and may attend and preside at any of their meetings.
- Sec. 4. The Bishop is the Chief Pastor of the Diocese, and may perform episcopal acts, officiate at any public service or preach_within any Parish or Mission or elsewhere in the Diocese.

ARTICLE 4 CONVENTION

- Sec. 1. The legislative power of the Diocese is vested in the Convention.
- Sec. 2. The Convention shall be composed of the Bishop, and the Bishop Coadjutor and Bishop Suffragan, if any, and of Priests, Deacons, and Lay Persons, as hereinafter provided.

- Sec. 3. The Bishop, and the Bishop Coadjutor and Bishop_Suffragan, if any, shall each have a seat and vote in the Convention.
- Sec. 4. Every Member of the Clergy who is canonically resident in the Diocese and who is ecclesiastically employed or appointed by the Bishop to ecclesiastical service in the Diocese or resident within it shall have a seat and vote in the Convention. A Member of the Clergy, licensed by the Bishop, who has charge of a Parish or Mission in the Diocese when Convention convenes shall also be entitled to a seat and vote.
- Sec. 5. The Lay Members shall consist of Delegates from the Parishes and Missions of the Diocese according to the schedule set out in the Canons. The Lay Delegates from each congregation shall be elected by its Annual Meeting, unless the congregation's by-laws provide for election by the Vestry or Bishop's Advisory Committee. Delegates shall be communicants in good standing in the Parishes and Missions they represent, and shall be at least 16 years of age. Alternates shall be elected in the same manner, with the same qualifications. Provision may be made by Canon for the election and designation of Delegates and Alternates from Missions failing to elect. Each Delegate shall serve for a period of one year from election or until a successor is chosen, and shall have duties between Conventions as shall be determined by the Canons or Convention. Notice of the election of Delegates shall be sent by the congregation to the Secretary of Convention within 30 days of their election.
- Sec. 6. The Convention shall be the final judge of the qualifications of its members, but no person under Ecclesiastical censure shall be entitled to a seat or vote in the Convention.
- Sec. 7. (a) Except as provided in subsection (b), officers of the Diocese and members of permanent Commissions, Committees, and Boards shall be entitled to seats in the Convention and all rights except the right to vote.
- (b) Notwithstanding subsection (a), duly elected or appointed Lay Members of the Board of Trustees, Standing Committee, and Diocesan Council shall have all rights, including the right to vote, at Conventions.
- Sec. 8. Annual or special meetings of the Convention shall be called and held as provided by the Canons of the Diocese.
- Sec. 9. The Bishop is ex officio President of the Convention. In the absence of the Bishop, the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, shall preside. If no Bishop with jurisdiction is present, the President of the Standing Committee shall serve as President pro tempore. If the President of the Standing Committee is not available, the Convention shall elect a President pro tempore from among its members.
- Sec. 10. Clergy from a majority of the congregations entitled to representation and Lay Delegates from a majority of the congregations entitled to representation, when assembled, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.
 - Sec. 11. The Convention shall deliberate and act as one body (except as elsewhere

provided in this Constitution or the Canons), unless a Vote by Orders be required by five members, each from a different congregation, in which case each Clerical member shall be entitled to one vote, and each Lay Delegate shall be entitled to one vote. When the vote is by Orders, the Clerical and Lay Orders shall vote separately and concurrently and a majority of votes cast in each Order shall be necessary to an affirmative decision or to an election.

- Sec. 12. All elections shall be by ballot unless dispensed with by unanimous consent.
- Sec. 13. No vote may be cast by proxy.

ARTICLE 5 OFFICERS

- Sec. 1. At each annual meeting, the Convention shall elect a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Registrar, and a Chancellor, upon nomination by the Bishop. They shall remain in office until their successors are elected and assume office. They shall perform the duties prescribed by Canon and by Resolution of the Convention.
- Sec. 2. To be elected to any of these offices the nominee shall be either a member of the Clergy canonically and geographically resident in the Diocese or a communicant in good standing of a Parish or Mission of the Diocese. Additional qualifications may be set out in Canon.
 - Sec. 3. The duties of each office shall be specified in Canon.
- Sec. 4. In case any of the officers provided for in this Article shall die, resign, remove from the Diocese, or become incapable of acting, the Standing Committee shall have the power to fill the vacancy thus created, by the election of a person eligible under the provisions of this Article; provided, that the Bishop, if there be one, shall exercise the right of nomination.

ARTICLE 6 STANDING COMMITTEE

- Sec. 1. The Standing Committee shall consist of four Members of the Clergy and four Lay Persons whose terms of office shall be four years. The Convention shall elect at each annual meeting by a Vote by Orders one member of the Standing Committee in each Order.
- Sec. 2. Any member of the Standing Committee who serves one full term shall not be eligible for re-election for a period of at least one year.
- Sec. 3. Each Member of the Clergy must be canonically and geographically resident in the Diocese, and each of the Lay Persons must be a communicant in good standing of a Parish or Mission of the Diocese. Vacancies in the Committee occurring by death or otherwise shall be filled until the next annual Convention by the concurrent vote of the Clerical and Lay members of the Committee.

Sec. 4. The authority and responsibilities of the Standing Committee are set out in the Canons of The Episcopal Church and of the Diocese of Oregon.

ARTICLE 7 DEPUTIES TO THE GENERAL CONVENTION

- Sec. 1. At the annual meeting of the Diocesan Convention occurring two years before the opening date of the next General Convention, the Convention shall elect four Clergy Deputies and four Lay Deputies, using the electoral standards set out in this Constitution and Canons. They shall continue in office until their successors are chosen. The Clerical Deputies shall be canonically and geographically resident in the diocese. The Lay Deputies shall be communicants in good standing of a Parish or Mission in the Diocese.
- Sec. 2. The Convention shall then elect the same number of Clergy and Lay Alternate Deputies, with the same qualifications as the Deputies, using the electoral standards set out in this Constitution or the Canons. In the event an elected Deputy cannot serve, the alternates from the same order shall be asked to serve based on the order of their election.

ARTICLE 8 ELECTION OF A BISHOP

- Sec. 1. The election of a Bishop, Bishop Coadjutor, or Bishop Suffragan shall be made only at an "Electing Convention," which shall be either the annual meeting of the Convention or a special meeting called solely for that purpose. The object of the special meeting shall be stated in a notice sent by the Secretary to every Member of the Clergy entitled on the date of the notice to a seat and vote in the Convention, to every Lay Delegate whose election has been certified to the Secretary, and to the Clerk of every Parish and Mission in the Diocese. The notice shall be sent at least ninety days before the time appointed for the special meeting.
- Sec. 2. The Standing Committee shall appoint a Search Committee which, consistent with the Canons of this Diocese, will develop the process to receive nominations for preparation of a Slate of Candidates, prepare the Slate, give notice to the Diocese and the electing delegates, and provide a process for receiving additional nominations.
- Sec. 3. The election shall proceed following presentation of the Slate of Candidates, together with any Nominee by Petition, to the Electing Convention. There shall be no further nominations from the floor of the Electing Convention. The vote shall be by Orders. If no election should result on the first ballot, subsequent ballots shall be taken without taking a recess between ballots, unless the Convention should determine otherwise.

ARTICLE 9

PARISHES AND MISSIONS

- Sec. 1. The adoption of this revision of the Constitution shall in no wise alter the present status of any Parish or Mission.
- Sec. 2. A Parish may be admitted into the Diocese by a majority vote of the annual convention, provided that it shall have met the conditions set out in Canons.
- Sec. 3. A Mission may be admitted into the Diocese by a majority vote of the annual convention, provided that it shall have met the conditions set out in Canons.
- Sec. 4. The Convention may, by Canon, prescribe further terms not in conflict with this Article, for the organization, admission, suspension and dissolution of Parishes and Missions.

ARTICLE 10 ASSESSMENTS

The Convention shall have the power to levy assessments on the Parishes and Missions by Canon or by Resolution, as needed to support the budget adopted by Convention. The Convention shall have the power to fix the dates at which the assessments shall fall due, and to impose penalties as it may see fit for failure to pay the assessments, as provided by Canon.

ARTICLE 11 CATHEDRAL

Trinity Episcopal Cathedral, an Oregon nonprofit corporation, is established and declared to be the Cathedral Church of this Diocese. It shall have the rights and duties of a Parish except that the Cathedral Chapter may consist of not more than eighteen members.

ARTICLE 12 DIOCESAN COUNCIL

- Sec. 1. There shall be a Diocesan Council, the at large members of which shall be elected by the Convention, and shall hold office until their successors shall be elected.
- Sec. 2. The Convention shall define by Canon the membership and powers of the Council.

ARTICLE 13 CORPORATION OF THE DIOCESE; BOARD OF TRUSTEES

- Sec. 1. The Church in this Diocese shall be incorporated under the laws of the State of Oregon under the name and title of THE DIOCESE OF OREGON.
- Sec. 2. The Canons shall provide for the election of the Board of Trustees of the Corporation and for the definition and exercise of its powers.

ARTICLE 14 AMENDMENT OF THE CONSTITUTION

- Sec. 1. Any proposed amendment shall be introduced in writing, by submission to the Secretary of Convention, at least 90 days before the beginning of the Convention at which it is to be considered. Notice of the proposal shall be sent to every Clergy and Lay Delegate to the Convention and to every congregation in the diocese. It shall also be referred promptly to the Committee on Constitution and Canons, which shall make its recommendation to the Convention.
- Sec. 2. If approved by a majority vote at the Convention at which it is initially presented, it shall lie over until the next annual meeting of the Convention. Notice of the amendment as passed shall be sent to the congregations and to those eligible to vote at the next convention.
- Sec. 3. If the amendment is -approved at the second Convention by a Vote by Orders, the amendment shall be adopted, and shall be in force from the date of adoption, unless some future date be specified in the amendment itself.

ARTICLE 15 REPEAL OF FORMER CONSTITUTIONS

All previous Constitutions of this Diocese are hereby repealed; provided, that such repeal shall not affect any case of a violation of existing Articles of any previous Constitution committed before the date of the adoption of the repeal; but such case shall be governed as if no repeal had taken place.
